## City Administrator is Grand Marshal

It will still be some time until he officially rides off into the sunset, but Seneca City Administrator Greg Dietterick recently enjoyed a fitting sendoff in the city's Christmas parade.

Dietterick, who's been with the city since 1998, served as the grand marshal in the parade — the final one to be held while he still makes the daily commute to City Hall, as his final day is set for June 30, 2018.

Dietterick announced his upcoming retirement in October, when he fought back tears when breaking the news to city council. And while he'll still be around for more than half a year as the city looks to find his successor — with Dietterick set to assist in the transition process — the City Administrator was touched by being named the parade's grand marshal.

"Being the grand marshal was an honor, and I was humbled to even be considered," he said. "It was an experience I won't forget. My grandchildren rode with me, so it was something they won't forget either.

"It was a great thing, and I'm very appreciative of the Oconee County Chamber of Commerce for even considering me. That was a great thing."

Seneca utilities director Bob Faires drove the car for Dietterick and his grandchildren in the parade, and he said he was proud to be able to play a role in a special moment for someone he considers a close friend.

"It was an honor," he said. "Greg has been a visionary for the city as he has worked along with the council. It's an honor to work with Greg, personally and professionally."

### Seneca's Kelley retires after nearly three decades

On Nov. 1, longtime City Hall fixture Cindy Kelley celebrated her 28th year as a city employee. Exactly one month later, she bid the city farewell as she headed off into retirement following a reception at the Lowery Building.

Though she said her decision was met with some good-natured resistance, from Mayor Dan Alexander and Mayor Pro-Tem Ronnie O'Kelley among many others, Kelley said she's looking forward to spending more time with her three grandchildren and her friends as she moves on to the next phase of her life.

"Just the people I work with," she said when asked what she'll miss most. "I love everybody I work with, but one good thing is this is a public place and I can come see them anytime I want to.

And the feeling is mutual, as city administrator Greg Dietterick said Kelley will most certainly be missed, as he didn't ever have to worry about his administrative assistant pulling her weight and then some.

"She was always there with a smiling face and would volunteer to help anytime we needed it," he said. "A lot of times, I didn't have to say anything — she just followed up.

"She's going to be missed, and I hope she enjoys a very good retirement after 28 years of service."

City planning director Ed Halbig said Kelley will be hard to replace at City Hall, as she's served as Dietterick's administrative assistant since he came to work for the city.

"She's always been one of the cheerful, bright, happy people in the building, so it's going to be quite an adjustment."

"Everybody knows her, and she knows everybody," Seneca Mayor Dan Alexander added. "If you want to know what's going on, you ask her. We wish her nothing but the best."
