BOTH POLICE DEPARTMENT AND COMMUNITY BENEFIT FROM CANINE OFFICERS

Canine officers play an important and vital role in modern law enforcement agencies. Not only do they serve in drug enforcement, search and rescue operations, and assist in apprehending fleeing subjects, they also serve as ambassadors of the police department. They happily appear at special events, interact with members of the community, and welcome head scratches. But, there's another important role that the canine officers play: they're an important bridge between law enforcement officers and the people they serve.

Many law enforcement agencies don't have a line item in their budget specifically targeted for the K9 unit. Creating a K9 unit - and keeping it running - is no small feat. And, it's not inexpensive. Canine officers can cost as much as \$12,000+. Add to that the expense of training the dog and its handler, a process that can take several months and costs thousands of dollars. Then, there is the ongoing training, a specialized K9 vehicle and special equipment, insurance, and vet bills. But, officers and communities both agree that the benefits of canine officers visible in the community are immeasurable.

The City of Seneca is fortunate to have its very own canine officer, Rogue. She is a Belgian Malinois, specifically trained for the grueling work she encounters in her daily duties. And, she is specifically trained to be a positive, calm influence when she greets the public in her role as an ambassador to the community. Rogue lives with her trainer, Joe Sorenson, and his family, but she is also a beloved member of her Seneca law enforcement family.

Because donations are extremely important in the funding of the Seneca PD K9 unit, a reoccurring golf tournament to benefit the department's K9 fund was created. Every year in the month of April, Rogue's Outing will be held at **Cross Creek Plantation**.

The vibe there is upbeat, and events held in this two-block vicinity promise busy walk-by and drive-by traffic, both locals and tourists alike.

The cost varies with the size of the window space, and are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Businesses can rent a window display for a minimum of a week and up to two months. An executed rental agreement and payment are required to reserve a space.
