The Seneca Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force was created to serve as a "think tank" to bridge communication between our ethnic Minority communities and our greater community; and, to promote a better understanding and appreciation of our similarities and differences. As a part of that purpose, the task force will submit proposals and recommendations to city leaders for consideration that will proactively develop initiatives for all communities; look at accountability measures that are intentionally inclusive of our marginalized communities; and, will positively affect short and long term equitable improvements and sustainability for the quality of life for the entire Seneca community. Although the task force is well aware that addressing many of the systemic issues in our city will require more than events and cultural celebrations, the task force has recommended communication to be the key to understanding and has proposed three city-wide events that will include a Juneteenth Celebration, a Youth Day Celebration, and a Hispanic Heritage Month. Moving forward, other areas the task force will be working on will include business development for minorities; diversity in employment and recruitment within the City; recreational opportunities for all age groups; and, more arts and culture opportunities (in partnership with the Seneca City Museums).

The task force's first report to Seneca City Council will be available in its entirety on the city web site (www.seneca.sc.us) after February 9th when the meeting documents are approved by City Council and posted.

This year as we confinue to observe safety protocol during the pandemic, Bertha Lee Strickland Cultural Museum's 9th Annual Black History Month Celebration will go virtual! Beginning February 12, 2021, and for the remainder of the entire month of February, you can be a part of the 9th Annual Black History Month Celebration and show your support of the museum's Fifth Anniversary Milestone! Our virtual celebration will feature this year's Keynatle Specker, Dr. Rhondda Robinson Thomas, Clemson University Calhoun Lemon Professor of Literature and author of Call My Name Clemson: Dacumenting the Black Experience in an American University Community. The online celebration will feature entertainment, rediscovered stories of Ocanee County's African American community, interviews, give-a-ways, and much more. And, anyone can access the month-long celebration at their convenience via Wi-Fi on their computer or tablet, and also via cell phone. The online event will be free and open to the public.

Owned and operated by the City of Seneca, Bertha Lee Strickland Cultural Museum opened on February 12, 2016, with its premier exhibit, The Waymakers, and has grown to become recognized across the United States as a tourism destination focusing on the local African American and related cultural histories of the people and places in Oconee County. Together with the Lunney Museum, these Seneca City Museums continue to break barriers and set benchmarks for small, micropolitan museums.
